John Ferejohn has been Samuel Tilden Professor of Law at NYU Law School since 2009. Previously he has held positions at Caltech, Stanford University and the Hoover Institution, and has been a regular visiting professor at NYU Law School and the Australian National University in Canberra. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Science and the National Academy of Sciences and of editorial boards of political science, law and philosophy. His research interests include the development of positive political theory and especially its application to the study of legal and political institutions and behavior. He has written on social choice theory, electoral processes, and theories of legislatures and of legislation. His current research focuses on Congress and policy making, courts within the separation of powers system, constitutional adjudication from a comparative perspective, democratic theory and law, and the philosophy of social science. His research has been published in leading journals of economics and political science, and he has published books, including *Pork Barrel Politics* (1974), *Personal Vote* (1987), and *Constitutional Culture and Democratic Rule* (2001).
